Key Vocabulary

climate

the weather conditions of a region over a period of time

biome

a large region of the Earth which is characterised by its vegetation, soil, climate and wildlife

density

the number of people living within each unit of area

economy

the way in which goods and services are made, sold and used within a country or area

rural

areas which are based in the countryside, not towns or cities

urban

areas located in cities or towns
